#### HOUSES AND HOMES

Block of flats /blok ov floets / A large building containing many apartments or flats.

Cottage /'kptidz/ A small house, usually in the countryside.

Detached house /di'tatst haus / A detached house is not joined to another house.

Farmhouse /'farmhous/ The house on a farm where the farmer lives.

Flat /floet/ A set of rooms to live in, with all the rooms on one level of a building

House /haus/ A building where people live, usually one family or group.

Hut /hat/ A small, simple building, often made of wood.

Skyscraper /'skai,skreipər/ A very tall building.

Tent /tent/ A structure made of metal poles and cloth which is fixed to the ground with ropes and used as a cover or to sleep under.

Terraced house /'terest haus / One of a row of houses that are joined together.

Semi-detached house / semiditets house have house that has one wall joined to another house.

## PARTS OF A HOUSE

Balcony /'bælkəni/ A small area joined to the wall outside a room on a high level where you can stand or sit.

Bathroom /'baz0ruzm/ A room with a bath, sink, and often a toilet.

Bedroom /'bedruim/ A room used for sleeping in.

Cellar /'selər/ A room under the floor of a building.

Ceiling /'sixlin/ The surface of a room which you can see when you look above you.

Dining room /daining ruim / A room where you eat your meals in a house or hotel.

Door /dor/ The space in a wall where you enter a building or room.

Doorbell /'doibel/ A button that you press next to a door that makes a noise to let someone know that you are there

Downstairs /, daun'ste $\partial z/$  To or on lower floor of a building, especially the ground floor.

Floor /flor/ A surface that you walk on inside a building.

Furniture /'f3:nItsər/ Objects such as chairs, tables, and beds that you put into a room or building.

Garage / 'garaiz/ A small building, often built next to a house, that you can put a car in.

Garden /'gaidən/ An area of ground belonging to a house, often containing grass, flowers, or trees.

Kitchen /'kItsin/ A room used to prepare and cook food in.

Lamp /læmp/ A piece of equipment that produces light.

Letterbox /'let.a.boks/ A rectangular hole in the door or in a wall near the entrance of a house through which letters, etc. are delivered.

Lift /lift/ A machine that carries people up and down in tall buildings.

Living room /'living ruim/ The room in a house where people sit to relax and, for example, watch television.

Roof /rusf/ The surface that covers the top of a building.

Sitting room /'siting ruim/ The room in a house where people sit to relax and, for example, watch television.

Stairs /steəz/ A set of steps from one level in a building to another.

Toilet /'toilit/ A room with a toilet in it.

Upstairs /np'steaz/ On or to a higher level of a building.

Wall /wxil/ One of the vertical sides of a room or building.

Window /'windou/ A space in the wall of a building that has glass in it, used for letting light and air inside and for looking through.

#### BEDROOM

Alarm clock /ə'larm klok / A clock that makes a noise to wake you.

Bed /bed/ A piece of furniture that you sleep on.

Bedside table /'bedsaid 'teibl / A small table which is kept at the side of a bed.

Bedspread /'bedspred/ A cloth cover that is put over a bed.

Blanket /'blankit/ A thick, warm cover that you sleep under.

Bunk bed /bank bed / One of two beds fixed together, one on top of the other.

Mattress /'mætrəs/ The soft, comfortable part of a bed that you lie on.

Mirror /'mirər/ A piece of glass with a shiny metallic material on one side which produces an image of anything that is in front of it.

Pillow /'pɪləʊ/ A soft object which you rest your head on in bed.

Sheet /sixt/ A large piece of cloth put on a bed to lie on or under.

Wardrobe /'woidroub/ A large cupboard for keeping clothes in.

## <u>BATHROOM</u>

Bath /bax0/ The container that you sit or lie in to wash your body.

Comb /kaum/ A flat piece of metal or plastic that you use to tidy your hair.

Hairbrush /'heabrass / A brush that you use to make your hair look tidy.

Hairdryer /'heə,draıər/ A piece of electrical equipment for drying your hair with hot air.

Plug /pl $_A$ g / A plastic or rubber object with metal pins, used to connect electrical equipment to an electricity supply

Razor /'reizər/ A piece of equipment with a sharp blade used for removing hair from the face, legs, etc

Tap /tæp/ The part at the end of a pipe (the long tube where water flows) which controls the flow of water.

Toilet - WC - Loo /'tɔɪlɪt//,dʌbljuɪ'siɪ/ /luɪ/ A bowl that you sit on when you get rid of waste substances from your body.

Toothpaste /'tu $I\theta$ peist/ A substance that you use to clean your teeth.

Towel /tauəl/ A soft piece of cloth that you use for drying yourself or for drying something. Washbasin /'wpʃ,beisən/ A bowl in a bathroom that water can flow into, used for washing your face or hands.

# LIVING ROOM

Armchair /'aɪm,tfeər/ A comfortable chair with sides that support your arms.

Ashtray /'æsitrei/ A small, open container used to put cigarette ash and finished cigarettes in.

Bookcase /'bukkeis/ A piece of furniture with shelves for putting books on.

Carpet /'karpit/ Thick material for covering floors, often made of wool.

Chair /tsear/ A seat for one person, with a back, usually four legs, and sometimes two arms.

Coffee table /'kpfi teibl / A low table in a room where people sit.

Curtain /'kaitan/ A piece of material which hangs down to cover a window.

Cushion /'kujan/ A cloth bag filled with something soft which you sit on to make you comfortable.

Fireplace /'faiəpleis/ A space in the wall of a room where you can have a fire.

Vase /vazz/ A container that you put flowers in.

### KITCHEN

Basket /'baskit/ A container with a handle made of thin pieces of wood, wire, plastic, etc

Broom /bruim/ A brush with a long handle used for cleaning the floor.

Brush /br/s/ An object made of short, thin pieces of plastic, wire, etc fixed to a handle and used to tidy hair.

Bucket /'bnkit/ A round, open container with a handle used for carrying liquids.

Coffee pot /'kpfi ppt / A container with a handle and shaped opening, for making and serving coffee in.

Cooker /'kukar/ A piece of equipment used to cook food.

Cupboard /'khbad/ A piece of furniture with a door on the front and shelves inside, used for storing things.

Dishwasher /'dɪʃ,wɒʃər/ A machine that washes plates, glasses and other kitchen equipment.

Freezer /'frizzər/ A large container operated by electricity in which food can be frozen and stored.

Fridge /fridz/ A large container that uses electricity to keep food cold.

Frying pan /frain pæn / A flat, metal pan with a long handle that is used for frying food.

Iron /aIan/ A piece of electrical equipment that you use for making clothes flat and smooth.

Mixer /'miksər/ A machine that mixes things.

Mop /mpp/ A piece of equipment used for cleaning floors that has a long handle and thick strings at one end.

Oven /'Avan/ A piece of kitchen equipment with a door which is used for cooking food.

Rubbish bin / 'rnbis bin/ A container that is used to put waste in.

Sink /sink/ A bowl that is fixed to the wall in a kitchen where you can wash dishes, your hands, etc

Soap powder /səup paudə / A dry substance made of many small grains that you use for washing.

Tin - Can /tin/ - /kcen/ A metal container for food or liquids.

Tin opener /tin əupənər/ A piece of kitchen equipment used to open bottles, cans, etc

Vacuum cleaner /'vækjuɪm kliɪnər/ An electric machine that cleans floors by sucking up dirt.

Washing machine /'wpfin mə'fiin / A machine that washes clothes.
